

HOLY TRINITY NEWS

A \$2.8 MILLION BEQUEST WAS RE-

CEIVED by Holy Trinity as part of a nearly \$29 million total left to five Worcester-area organizations more than 60 years after the death of the benefactor, a local entrepreneur and industrialist. Holy Trinity Nursing & Rehabilitation is extremely grateful to have received this bequest. As is usual in these kinds of bequests, the principal funds are permanently restricted by the donor, with only the interest able to be used to continue providing services to the elderly.

A GRANT OF \$49,500 was received by Holy Trinity to enable it to implement an electronic medical records system! Holy Trinity applied for this grant from MeHI (Massachusetts eHealth Institute) and its implementation will help to improve the efficiency of care it provides.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS FROM THE OR-THODOX COMMUNITY are provided each year to each one of the residents of Holy Trinity Nursing and Rehab. Our Parish is responsible for providing some of those gifts. You will be asked to purchase and wrap the gift, and bring it to the Church on Sunday, December 13th. Eleanor Sedares (508-753-3106) is coordinating this effort for our parish and can offer suggestions if you need ideas of what to get.

EAT, DRINK, AND BE MERRY?


THE GOSPEL LESSON THIS WEEK, is the parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12:16-21). In the lectionary schedule of our Church, this parable is usually read near Thanksgiving, which proves to be quite appropriate. Thanksgiving is first and foremost about keeping the things of this life in perspective, and learning how to give thanks always, and for everything.

In order to understand the parable, we need to look at a few of the preceding verses. St. Luke tells us that while Jesus was teaching to a large gathering, someone from among the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me" (v. 13). Jesus responds with a question, asking why he (Jesus) should be the arbiter. Then the Lord says to him: "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions" (v. 15). It is in this context that the Lord tells them parable of the Foolish Rich Man.

The story itself is rather straightforward, even predictable. A certain rich person, presumably after a life's worth of work, finally had the kind of harvest that would set him up for his retirement. Not having the possibility of a 401K, he decided to build bigger barns in order to store this bumper crop. This would be his retirement income.

The Lord tells us that he then said to his soul, "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry" (v. 19). He simply wants to be comfortable. He thinks that this is his due. He has accumulated all of this wealth, and will be able to live off of it for a long time.

God says to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you And the things you have prepared whose will they be?" (v. 20) He



concludes with this admonition: "So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God" (v. 21).

At first we are struck by the most obvious point of the parable, our own mortality and the unpredictability of death. But if we look a little more closely we can see that the Lord is saying much more than just "you can't take it with you." He is saying that "one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." There is more to life — our life — than what we might accumulate, or at least there should be.

Listen again to the last verse: "So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God." It is greed and selfishness that the Lord is warning us against. This man was thinking only of himself, not of others. He was not intending to share the

wealth he had accumulated. He says to his soul, "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." However, the soul's wealth is measured in good deeds, not material possessions.

We are reminded of another of Jesus' sayings: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6:19-21)

When we gather with family and friends to celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday this coming Thursday, we should ask ourselves where our heart is. Our tables may be laden down with all good things, but are we rich in the eyes of God? If our lives were required of us this very night, and we were to stand before the Judge, which way would the scales tip?

The spiritual life — the Life in Christ — is about keeping the things of this earthly existence in proper perspective. The old adage is true: you cannot buy happiness. The happy person is the one with a generous and gentle heart.

We live in a land of abundance, but many go hungry around us. We try to make ourselves comfortable with the fading things of this life, while many live in squalor. If we have been given much, we need to share. If we share then Thanksgiving will truly fill our hearts. We will be rich, in God's eyes and in our own as well.
