#### **LENTEN RESOURCES**

We are beginning the journey toward Pascha, the Lord's Resurrection. To help along the way, each week we'll be posting some resources and reflections aimed at assisting and informing.

THE SATURDAY BEFORE THE SUNDAY OF THE LAST JUDGMENT. On the day before the Sunday of the Last Judgment, and in close connection with the theme of this Sunday, there is a universal commemoration of the dead 'from all the ages'. (There are further commemorations of the dead on the second, third and fourth Saturdays in Lent.) Before we call to mind the Second Coming of Christ in the services on Sunday, we commend to God all those departed before us, who are now awaiting the Last Judgment. In the texts for this Saturday there is a strong sense of the continuing bond of mutual love that links together all the members of the Church, whether alive or dead. For those who believe in the risen Christ, death does not constitute an impassable barrier, since all are alive in Him; the departed are still our brethren, members of the same family with us, and so we are conscious of the need to pray insistently on their behalf.

THE SUNDAY OF THE LAST JUDGMENT. (Gospel reading: Matthew 25:31–46). The two past Sundays spoke to us of God's patience and limitless compassion, of His readiness to accept every sinner who returns to Him. On this third Sunday, we are powerfully reminded of a complementary truth: no one is so patient and so merciful as God, but even He does not forgive those who do not repent. The God of love is also a God of righteousness, and when Christ comes again in glory, He will come as our judge. 'Behold the goodness and severity of God' (Rom. 11:22). Such is the message of Lent to each of us: turn back while there is still time, repent before the End comes. In the words of the Great Canon:

The end draws near, my soul, the end draws near;

Yet thou dost not care or make ready.

The time grows short, rise up: the Judge is at the door.

The days of our life pass swiftly, as a dream, as a flower.

This Sunday sets before us the 'eschatological' dimension of Lent: the Great Fast is a preparation for the Second Coming of the Saviour, for the eternal Passover in the Age to Come. (This is a theme that will be taken up in the first three days of Holy Week.) Nor is the judgment merely in the future. Here and now, each day and each hour, in hardening our hearts towards others and in failing to respond to the opportunities we are given of helping them, we are already passing judgment on ourselves.

**FASTING RULES.** One question that often comes up is: **What are the Fasting rules?** We've linked here one of the better explanations of the rules around fasting. It is taken from the *Lenten Triodion*, translated and edited by Metropolitan Kallistos Ware and Mother Mary. If you've never been exposed to the whole discipline of the Fast, reading the rules can seem very daunting. You should seek advice from your spiritual father; no one should try this without guidance.

# A Prayer of Fr. Laurence

# When the Son of Man Comes in Glory

This is Meat-fare Sunday, the last preparatory Sunday before the beginning of Lent. The appointed Gospel reading is the Last Judgment (Matthew 25:31-46). Unlike in other places in the Gospels where the Lord speaks of the Kingdom of God through parables, here he speaks directly of what his Coming will be like. Also, the Gospels lessons for the past two Sundays — the parables of the Publican and Pharisee, and the Prodigal Son — were gentle admonitions urging us toward repentance. Here the Lord clearly tells us what will be expected of us when we are judged.

The first thing we should pay attention to is that at the final judgment everyone will be gathered in front of the Judge, and

then separated into two groups (v. 32). Up until that time good and evil were allowed to commingle in the world. At the judgment they will be separated, on the right and on the left, sheep from goats, good from evil.

People often wonder about the presence of evil in the world and why the Lord allows it to exist. Jesus explains this in the parable of an enemy who sowed weeds in a newly planted wheat field (Matthew 13:24-30). When the householder found out what his enemy had done, and his servants asked what they should do, he told them to leave the weeds alone, because in gathering the weeds they would uproot the wheat as well (v. 29). "Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at the harvest time I will tell the reapers, 'Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn'" (v. 30). The Last Judgment is the "harvest time."

The second thing we should notice is the standard by which we will be judged: I was hungry and you fed me. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave me clothing. I was sick and you took care of me. I was in prison and you visited me. Everyone is capable of doing this. These acts of kindness form the very basis of our humanity.

If we aspire to be human, we need to be compassionate. The Lord doesn't speak here of Christian values such as love of enemy and self-sacrifice to the point of death. He will not expect this of everyone. Actually, he isn't even expecting what today we would call "systemic solutions." He doesn't say, "I was in prison and you freed me." Rather, he says, "I was in prison and you visited me." What will be expected of us is a basic emotion, one that we are all capable of: empathy. Empathy, coupled with a willingness to act in order to alleviate the suffering of the person in front of us, is the mark of a humanity to which each of us is called.

I am often asked how God will judge people of other faiths. This is the answer. God will judge us by how we have treated the weakest and most vulnerable among us. He identifies himself with the least and the smallest. Everyone is capable of compassion. Each of us can learn not be selfish and self-centered.

The third thing that should be pointed out is how the Judge addresses each of the two groups. To those on the right he says, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (v. 34). The "blessed" are heirs, children of God. The kingdom was prepared for them when God created the world. This is God's eternal intention for us.

To those on the left he says, "You are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels" (v. 41). The fires of eternal punishment were not and are not intended for us. We are called to be the children of God. Separation from God and punishment are the results of being blind to the suffering of others.

We live in a world where there is hunger and poverty, sickness and suffering, all around us. Each of us must stop and think. How will we answer on that dread day when we stand before the judge, and our deeds are laid bare before angels and people?
